What does it mean for a region to be **FOOD SECURE?**

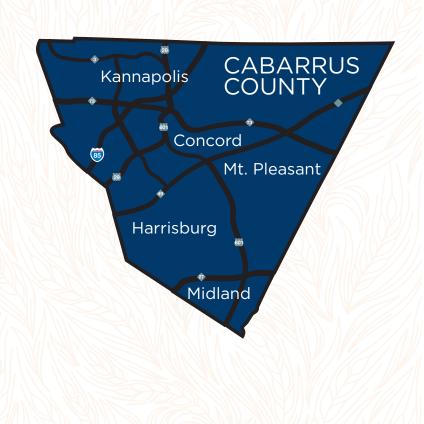

WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?



As eloquently as He so often does through Scripture, Jesus answers the question, "Who is my neighbor?" in Luke, Chapter 10 by telling the story of the Good Samaritan. In and through the telling of that story, Jesus impresses the need for us to hear and understand clearly the Greatest of Commandments.

Inspired by the commandment to love our neighbor and recognizing an ever-pressing need of families in our Cabarrus and Southern Rowan county communities who are facing grocery budgets increasingly impacted by inflation, Cooperative Christian Ministry (CCM) continues to serve those affected through our **Samaritan's Table** evening meal program.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

- Matthew 22:37-40

In our 15th year in partnership with local churches who not only serve as hosts of the Samaritan's Table evening meals but also as meal providers, this program makes a significant impact on the families which we serve.

The benefits of this evening meal program have surpassed CCM's expectations over the years, as many of those we've served were unaware of the resources available to them or simply didn't know how to access them. Moreover, this program has been opportunistic for CCM staff and collaborating church members and volunteers to pray with and witness to those we serve.

We invite YOU to consider a partnership with CCM through our Samaritan's Table program. Our current need involves providing and serving meals once a month on a Thursday evening at Kimball Lutheran Church in Kannapolis, N.C.

In CCM's 2025 New Horizon Strategic Plan, with the goal of improving and nurturing the overall development of children in vulnerable households

throughout our community, the first objective is to "improve access to good nutrition and medical care for prenatal women and children, birth through age 5." The first strategy under that objective is to "increase access to CCM food programs for expectant mothers and mothers of children age 0-5 and enhance our ability to provide agespecific nutritious food and nutrition education."

After consulting with a variety of entities working with prenatal mothers and preschool children, the CCM Food Program developed a plan to provide not only additional food for these populations, but also information about other available resources in our community. To begin, we are targeting pre-natal women. There has been ample research done to highlight the huge importance of a healthy diet for expectant moms for the child's development and future dietary habits.

In the very near future, the CCM Food Program will assemble special boxes of healthy, balanced, nutritionally strong non-perishable foods as a sample of what the expectant mom needs to be eating. We also will include in the boxes information about how to apply for WIC and FNS/SNAP (food stamps), and general prenatal nutrition, and in the boxes distributed beyond CCM, there will be information about the CCM food pantries. Expectant moms who come to the CCM Crisis Center Food Pantry will receive the boxes in addition to their regular order of produce, bakery, meats, and non-perishable items.

We are developing partnerships with the Cabarrus Health Alliance clinics, local crisis pregnancy centers, and local OB/GYN clinics to provide the food boxes to any expectant moms who identify as being food insecure on social determinants screenings.

To me, this strategy is an excellent example (out of many!) of what the 2025 New Horizon Plan is all about: targeting specific populations who need extra help, using the strengths of CCM, and building collaboration among area agencies and entities, all for the purpose of enhancing the lives of our neighbors and in turn creating a stronger community.

Nonprofit Collaboration in Cabarrus County

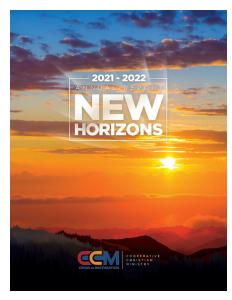
